All delegates agreed that quality in dentistry is important and has to be part of the work in the ERO.

The plan to organise an ERO Consensus conference on quality issues has not been realised. The first topic to be discussed has been pain management. An ERO statement on "Pain Management" was drafted by ERO Liaison Officer to CEN, Philippe Calfon, and discussed and adopted during the 2008 Plenary Session in Istanbul.

Quality in healthcare has been a largely discussed topic during the last three years in EU and non-EU countries. In some states quality is already a legal issue, in others it is about to be imposed by law and in many of them it is liberal to pay attention to it. The WG has analysed several data from different publications of activities and research dealing with quality in dentistry from EU- and other countries. It has been evidenced that a clear definition of quality does not even exist in the EU member states nor are quality strategies equal in their entity, and quality assurance is different from country to country. Even though some guidelines and recommendations on quality of structure, process and outcome do already exist in some ERO countries, it has been clearly stated that the definition of guidelines is not realistic for the Organisation. The approach that consists in adapting quality models from the industry such as the Toyota model to medicine and dentistry has been definitely abandoned.

A questionnaire on quality issues sent out to all member associations has been considered by more than half of the ERO member states. While most of the members wanted to focus on quality of procedure and improvement of dental practice, others wanted to draw attention to legal issues and their application. Almost all participants declared that much has to be done to implement quality management, quality assurance and quality

maintenance, but a clear definition of these terms remains mandatory.

Rewarding for the application of quality strategies has been discussed in the context of the global economic and financial crisis. Quality makes a difference even in difficult times and could help to save money. The latter aspect however has to be verified. Data collection and exchange is needed and shall help to keep the quality issue within the profession. A standard of quality of outcome cannot be realised in any field of medicine or dentistry although it is requested from third parties. The profession must also pay much attention to acts dividing the profession and to the quality of behaviour of professionals.

A quality model on a legal basis applied in the UK has been presented and discussed. "Quality is not an option, it is a necessity" is the final statement of the author. Quality measures shall be carefully analysed in order to avoid external regulations. The professional expertise of the dentist is the only key to the development of quality in dental care. All citizens of the ERO area shall have the possibility to maintain and improve their health status. Quality in dental care is one of the essential prerequisites to reach this goal and finds its realisation in effective treatment options, in safe conditions for the patient and the dental team, and corresponding to the patients needs and wishes.

Quality in the dental profession, its implementation and the improvement of dental practice will always depend on education as well as technical and communicational skills, together with the capacity of critical thinking and the behavioural qualities of the individual professional. Quality in public services will depend on the awareness of the Governments that the delivery of quality is furthermore based on time, adequate financial and sufficient human resources.

The definition of dental quality and the effectively useable quality measures together with the evaluation of data and experiences with quality models remain the commitments for the future of the ERO WG "Quality in Dentistry".

To all who served in the WG in the name of quality in dentistry, to all who participated in the questionnaire and the discussions in the last three years I would like to express my sincere gratitude.

The WG "Parity" was initially chaired by Dr. Dianiskova, who was later replaced by Dr. Anna Lella. The aim of this WG was to obtain a "photograph" of dental practice in the different countries of Europe. The Board therefore asked Dr. Lella to change the topic of her WG, and so the new topic "Relations between dental practitioners and universities" was chosen. The WG "The Dental Team" chaired by Edoardo Cavallé is very important. Its mission is to compare professional training in Europe, professional entitlement, recognition of diplomas, etc. The group uses existing publications, the Bologna Declaration, the FDI statements, and the topics discussed at the CED, to reach an agreement.

In Singapore, during the Plenary Session, was voted the draft resolution "Dental Team, Tasks And Responsibilities -Top quality for patient safety and oral health care". This is an important document that describes the main characteristics of a truly qualitative practice of dentistry.

The WG is currently working on the profile of the "Dental Chairside Assistant".

A huge amount of work has been accomplished so far within the ERO WG "Enlargement". The main target of the WG is to bring new members from Eastern Europe to the ERO and to harmonize the level of dentistry between Eastern and Western Europe.

During the last three years, Dr. Vladimir Sadovski made a number of visits to the new ERO member countries for serious negotiations with the authorities of the Ministries of Public Health of these new ERO members.

Negotiations – positive in every respect – were held with the Chief Dental Officers and the authorities of the Ministries of Public Health of Tajikistan, Kazakstan, Ukraine, Russia, and Georgia.

Dr. Vladimir Sadovski was also constantly in touch with the Presidents of the National Dental Associations and the Chief Dental Officers of these and other new member countries to consult, support and coordinate reforms in dentistry in those countries. The support which the ERO gave to new member countries helped them to develop dentistry according to or with the guidance of Western European standards of dentistry, and gave them confidence that dentistry in their countries was assured a stable future. This work should and must be continued because despite all the support given to the new member countries by the ERO and the WG "Enlargement", the level of dentistry in a majority of these countries still remains below that of Western Europe (low fare dental services, irrational system of Continuing Education, etc.).

The next step planned by the WG "Enlargement" is to provide help in the creation of Liberal Dental Practice in the Eastern European member countries of the ERO. This is a very important step and work in this direction should also be continued.

On the Pan-European Dental Congress (PEDC)

Since the Plenary Session in Moscow in April 2007, three Pan-European Dental Congresses were held under the aegis of the ERO in three different ERO member countries, under the direction of Dr. Vladimir Sadovski. The 1st PEDC, which was attended by over 1.800 professionals, was held in Moscow (April 2007). The 2nd PEDC was held in Istanbul (July 2008) with over 700 attendees. And finally, the 3rd PEDC, for which over 2.500 dental professionals were registered, was held in Kiev, Ukraine, in December 2009.

The ERO Board made the important decision to organize the first five Pan-European Dental Congresses in the Eastern European ERO member countries. Thus, the PEDC should help new member countries to tighten up the level of dentistry to Western European standards. The PEDC is a non-commercial project which makes no profits but helps the ERO to acquire more popularity and increases European dentists' awareness of organisations such as the ERO.

It is obvious today that the PEDC as a project should keep its place among ERO interests for the coming years.

Dr. Sadovski has recently been entrusted by the ERO Board with a new project, currently underway: to convince companies who work in the dental area to become Affiliate members of the ERO.

The WG "Education" was created in 2003 in Bucharest. In 2007 in Moscow, important modifications were made and a three-year agenda was established.

2007:

The WG was involved in the Scientific Program of the 1st Pan European Congress (PEDC). A European Continuing Education programme was also proposed. Main topics:

- 1 an Educational system, based on a choice of basic disciplines
- 2 A modular holistic Continuing Education Programme
- 3 Means and resources: a block system that should allow progressive learning and updating, with:
 - a/ Conferences/Congresses
 - b/ Symposiums, Round tables, Consensus Conferences
 - c/ Hands-on Courses/training programmes
- 4 Partnership: to be realistic, such a Programme should be supported by the NDA and the Industry, with the contribution also of voluntary Educators
- 5 Follow-up and accreditation
- 6 * Presentation by Prof. V. Jerolimov and Prof.
 N. Yamalik at the FDI Annual World Dental Congress in Dubai
 - * Participation in the XXII AIO National Congress in Cagliari, Sardinia, Italy
 - * Participation in the XVI International Congress, Bucharest, Romania
 - * Participation in the International Congress, Yerevan, Armenia

Concerning the disciplines, the means of Education and their Level: out of 16 countries, the answers from 14 were received and analysed.

2010:

Current situation and Future Perspectives:

Difficulties in raising funds appeared and after the financial crisis it was difficult to motivate our partners.

E-learning is difficult to promote in Eastern European Countries. It seems that the Programmes need to be better adapted to the practitioners. It was therefore decided to enhance and develop the classical teaching system.

Another problem has been a lack of coordination with the FDI Eastern European Education programme managers. All the parties involved at this time have shown great interest in this issue, and real progress was noted in the last discussions.

Scientific Session 2010

After having addressed in depth the issues of Quality (Moscow 2007), Risk Management (Istanbul 2008) and Fluoride Use (Rome 2009), the ERO this year is organising a scientific session on "A Global Medical Approach at the Service of the Profession".

The 2010 Scientific session will take place on Friday 30th April from 2 to 5 p.m. Five topics will be explored by speakers of international renown:

- Prof. Denis Bourgeois (France) will talk about "The oral health of people with diabetes";
- Prof. Luca Ramaglia (Italy) will investigate "Periodontal health Policy and Education in Europe";
- Prof. Valeri Tatentsyan (Armenia) will address the issue of "Oral health in people with cardiovascular problems";

- Dr Francisco Rodriguez Lozano (Spain) will underline the importance of "The involvement of the dental profession in the screening and care of precancerous oral lesions"
- Prof. Alex Mersel (Israel) will end the session with possible answers to the following question: "Gerodontology: how should the profession be organised to face the demographic evolution?"

Live.Learn.Laugh: LLL is a public-private partnership launched in 2005. It covers 40 projects in 38 participating countries and works through the collaboration between FDI member national dental associations and local Unilever partners, with the aim too increase oral health education and promotion in countries around the world. Phase II begins in 2010.
